

Water exhibition for Lent fifth week

Water, an essential part of our human life.

When we were born ¾ of our bodies are made of water, the chemical, electrical connections through the water element allows us to grow and function. We continually need new water to replace what we lose daily. It is essential we live as part of this actively cycling world water system that continually purifies and supports all life.

To horde water, block access to water, pollute water makes all life suffer and understanding this makes us realise how water is used as a weapon in wars. To 'salt the earth' in historical times was to stop access to water by agriculture, by poisoning the soil of conquered cities. In the Ukraine blowing up dams blocking the river Dnipro caused widespread damage and the spread of landmines.


Whether deliberate or accidental the cost for Palestinians of the damage to the water supply in Gaza is dreadful. Lack of fresh water means disease, poor medical treatment and death for many. Flooding the tunnels under Gaza in a military action will mean polluted aquifers damaging agriculture in the area for ever.



These world events are in our prayers, but also this week let us use our minds to really understand the water we have access to. Our water in Earley mainly comes from aquifers fed by rain in the area also drained by the river Loddon.

The water supply in the Reading area was created after the last great cholera epidemic in 1854 which killed tens of thousands who had poor water supply, spreading the disease to everyone. We are the beneficiary of those great Victorian engineers and those who considered the social good of every one

through an efficient water supply to be of prime importance because of their Christian faith. This photo is of Earley's stand pipe, an historical record of our nations water. Now imagine if this was your main supply of fresh water, and imagine carrying it everyday back to your house! To help the Toilet Twinning project;-Using a public convenience in Victorian times cost a penny. This is the equivalent to 50p



The Electoral Roll will be revised ahead of this year's Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) on 28 April. The revision started on 14 March and any additions or amendments must be completed by 7 April

Being a member of the electoral roll gives you the opportunity to have your say. This will include giving you a vote at the APCM (Annual Parochial Church Meeting).

If you are already on the roll you don't need to do anything. If however you have moved or changed contact details in anyway please let the parish office know. There is a copy of the roll at the back of Church on the Noticeboard if you would like to check if you are already on there.

If you would like to go on the electoral roll you must 16 or over, baptised and not a member of the clergy. You must also either live in the parish OR if you don't you must have regularly attended worship at Earley St Nicolas for the last 6 months.
